

Ideas & Activities




Create 'Memory' card game but instead of using identical cards, create cards for heads and tails that together create an insect/animal/fish or other creature. Set up a display in the library with the three books in the series and add a sign inviting students to play.


Students can use Quizlet to create their own insect flash cards, featuring interesting facts and descriptions.

Recognisable shapes and colours make cut-outs fairly simple, add pipe cleaners for legs and antennae and create a hanging mobile.

Organise students into groups of seven, and turn the book into a play, with each playing the part of a character from the book. Even more fun if the staff dress up and perform the play for the kids as a surprise.




Ideas & Activities



Rewrite the story with human characters instead of animals. How would the story change?

Text to Self: Have you ever lost your way? How did you feel? Who can you go to for help if this happens to you? (potential link to 'stranger danger')

Fun stuff on Alison Lester's website includes a *Noni the Pony* picture with a lot of white space – great for colouring-in and drawing activities.




- What really makes a house a home?
- Interesting inclusion of rented and—based on description —potentially lower-socio economic housing (unusual in picture books)
- Reassuring for children who are moving house, which can be a frequent occurrence in rented accommodation
- Dress-up themes fit nicely with Book Week
- Patrick Guest had another book in 2019 longlist (*Rabby* the Brave) and The Second Sky was shortlisted in 2018
 - How do you turn things around when you're experiencing a 'bad day'?
 - Value of going outdoors and/or doing something different to change perspective
 - Patient father / positive father/child relationship

Ideas & Activities



Paint a large cardboard box to look like the dress-up box from the story. Fill the box with a collection of simple fancy-dress items that can easily be put on and removed - eg. Hats, feather boas, scarves, funny glasses, masks, fake noses etc.

Create a large selfie frame and invite students to wear their favourite outfit from the box, and have their photo taken. Print the photos out and display them on the wall behind the box. Vote and have a book prize for the winner.



'Turn your bad day around' poster with tips on how kids can turn a not-very-good day into a great one. Positive tips could include: going for a walk, playing outside, reading an interesting book, spending time with people you love, sharing your problems with a friend or family member, cuddling your pet, writing a story or song, designing or making something. You could invite students and staff to add their ideas to the poster.



Picture Books - Ideas & Activities



Library Display: Source an old keyboard and computer monitor (or paint a box to look like one). Set it up on a desk with 'in' and 'out' trays, a clock on the wall and a tent card featuring the name 'Cicada'. Hang a suit jacket on a hook behind or over the back of the chair. Display the book on the desk.

Write a story where the roles are reversed so the main character is a human working amongst insects and/or animals. How would the dynamics be different? How would the story end?


Discuss: 'Routine can either serve you or confine you'



Read Article: 40 Australian Street Artists you Need to Know, then use Google Earth Tour Builder to plot the locations of their art installations

Create: As a class, draw your own street art pictures and then put them together in iMovie to recreate the story in the book.

Game: Street Art – Tate Kids




Picture Books - Ideas & Activities



- Library display: Use oil or acrylic paint to create the cloudy, ethereal background seen in the book. Add a string to represent the tight rope. Cut out some paper dolls and position them so they are walking along it towards the light.
- Writing activity: Imagine that you are walking across the tight rope. Write a first person account detailing what you can see, how you feel while you are walking, what you're afraid of and how it feels to get to the other side.
- Games for building resilience
- Library display: Source large ostrich feathers (available at minimal cost online) and create one giant feather. Simplest as a wall display but could hang from the ceiling with a framework of chicken wire.
- Writing activity: Write a short story about the world Nico and Maria live in. Why is it so dark and gloomy? What do you think happened to the town that made it this way?





Picture Books - Ideas & Activities



- Library display: Paint a large cardboard box with the same signage as the Orange 430. Add a large price tag. Find some other 'useless' objects and add price tags, with a backdrop that says 'April Fools' Sale'. Refer to pages 5 and 6 in the book for inspiration.
- Discussion and research: What happens to 'useless' products. Research the environmental impact of products and their packaging. How can we make a difference?
- Mr Ripoff's Activity: Penguin website •
- Writing activity: Create words for each page to give the story a 'voice'. How does this change the tone or meaning of the book
- Discuss: Can you recall a time when you stayed silent instead of speaking up about something you knew was wrong? Do you know why you stayed silent? How do you feel about it now?
- Library Display: Use acrylic paint on card to recreate the front cover background. Replace the title with 'refugees' and add relevant stats from 'Global Trends at a Glance' on the UN website.



New Illustrators- Ideas & Activities



- **Research/Activity:** Research deforestation and its impact on Australian birds. Use Canva to create a poster about conservation of the Carnaby Cockatoo or another endangered bird.
- Arts: Create a collage representing the environment Carmichael would live in using found materials like twigs, leaves, dirt and bark.

Writing activity: Choose another Australian animal and write a book using the same format. Focus on its daily life and include its habitat, food source and a description of its appearance.

Art activity/Library display: Invite students to choose their favourite scene from *Dingo* and paint their own interpretation using the artistic techniques employed by the book's illustrator using oil or acrylic paint. Create a display wall to feature their work.



New Illustrators



- Albert is having a very ordinary birthday in the midst of an ordinary life when Grandma Z rides into town on her motorcycle and takes him on a grand adventure
- Unusual colour palette predominantly fluorescent orange and blue

New Illustrators- Ideas & Activities




Library display: Create a large cardboard cake in the signature blue and orange neon colours of *Grandma Z*. Display the book on top of the cake.

Art: Imagine your own unordinary birthday. Draw an unusual activity you would participate in. This could be something from the book or your own imagination. Use two strongly contrasting colours in your illustration.

Library display: Using large cardboard boxes, create your own cardboard house to use as a reading nook. Ask students to decorate it in the colours and style of the illustrations.

Research: Research the history of colour. Who invented the first colour wheel? What did this person discover about rainbows? How were his findings different to what scientists understood before this?





New Illustrators- Ideas & Activities



Activity: Create a poster about an Australian bird that was not featured in the book. Include your own drawing of the bird and factual information. Write a short paragraph (or do a 1 minute presentation) stating your case for why your bird should have been featured in the book.

Library display: Print your own bird posters (free downloads on Birds in Backyards website). Create a combined display with Carmichael's Journey, Australian Birds, Our Birds and any other bird titles from your collection.

Library display: Create a poster for Florence's performance. Base it on the poster on the last page of the book or come up with your own design (could be run as a competition).

Activity: Use the Draw and Tell App to create a video of Florence giving a performance.



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Information Books – Ideas & Activities




- Activity: Search the Tricklar News Cloud Generator for the word 'indigenous' (or another keyword) for a period of up to 4 weeks. Choose a shape, colours, font and background. Print the word clouds to create a wall display. Discuss the results.
- **Discuss:** The author and illustrator have chosen to depict two children from different generations of the same family. Why do you think they did that?
- Library display: Source a vibrant gift box with a lid from your local discount store and cut a postbox opening in the top. Make a sign pointing to it saying 'Happiness Box'. Have slips of coloured paper nearby and invite students to write down something that makes them happy and place it in the box.
- Writing activity: Research the original *The Happiness Box* (digital version available free online). Imagine you had received the book from the soldiers as a gift in a time of war. Write them a letter thanking them and talk about how the book made you feel. Include a drawing or short story to lift their spirits.



Information Books



- Every bird is represented with a photo taken by Siena Stubbs when she was 12-years-old and named in both English and Yol(ng)u Matha.
- Stories about how the photos were taken, her favourite thing about the birds, and her childhood memories.
- Both an insight to the birds and their habits and to the culture and knowledge surrounding Stubbs as a member of the Yol(ng)u people.
- Includes a short biography of this Dutch artist and some of his well-known works
- Using riddles, activities, questions and fun facts, it explores topics such as Escher's artistic techniques, the anatomy of the human eye, what space is like and much more.
- Mind-boggling optical-illusions




Information Books – Ideas & Activities



- Activity: Take a photo of a bird in your school grounds or your backyard. Use a photo editing app like Snapseed and a design app like Canva to create a layout like that in the book and write up some facts about the bird.
- Research: Choose a bird from the book and research its meaning in Indigenous culture. Find the names for your bird in different Indigenous languages.

Library display/activity: Using Photos For Class, print some of MC Escher's optical illusions. Put them in plain frames and hang them as a collection in the library like they would in an art gallery.

Invite students to write reviews for the artworks, talking about the techniques Escher used and what they like about the work. Print these out on cardboard and display them below the art to mimic a gallery feel.








- Rare 'good news' story of animal conservation in Australia, told from the POV of an Eastern Barred Bandicoot.

Information Books – Ideas & Activities



Library display: Cut a viewing window in the front of a box and cover it with cellophane. Add a sign: 'I am one of Australia's most threatened species. Who am I?' behind the box, and put up cards with clues about the animal's habitat, lifestyle, diet, predators, and threat to survival. Inside the box place a picture of an Eastern Barred Bandicoot.

Activity: Working in a small group, imagine you work for a TV 'Past News' channel. Create interview questions for one of the children featured in the book, to interview them on their arrival. 

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
Younger Readers – Ideas & Activities



- **Library display:** Print images of the native animals featured in *Black Cockatoo* and print out the corresponding Indigenous names for these animals (available in the book's glossary). Using velcro, stick the images up on a board and leave the names to one side, allowing students to match the name to the correct animal. Reset as necessary.
- Writing activity: Write a short story from the black cockatoo's perspective. How does it feel being kept in a cage? What does it think of Mia and Jy? Does the bird miss its home and family?
- Display/activity: Use an overhead projector to draw the silhouette of Pender (a boy) and Brindabella (a kangaroo) on black cardboard. Cut them out and display them on a wall next to each other. Using neon pens, ask students to add keywords to both silhouettes, describing each character's appearance, likes, dislikes, natural habitat, key events in their life etc.
- Activity: Research animal captivity and have a short debate between two teams - one arguing that Brindabella should have stayed with Pender and the other arguing she should be free. Think about the difference between having Brindabella and Billy-Bob, the dog, as pets.




Younger Readers (8-12 years)



- An outstanding writer at the top of her game
- Brilliant example of a frame story (in this case a story within a story within a story)
- In the present day two children find a handwritten book containing a fairy tale style story written by Walter.
- Ultimately the fairy tale is an allegory for what happened when Walter returned from WWII and fell in love with a bank manager's daughter. The bank manager killed him to cover up his own embezzling and blamed Walter for the thefts. Children find his body and clear his name.
- Strong supernatural themes. Ages 10 to 15 years.
- A beautifully constructed verse novel
- Following the death of Toby's younger sister Leah from cancer, his parents sell the (generational) family farm.
- Inspired by a his father's childhood map of the farm, Toby creates his own map of special places and memories and travels a goodbye tour around the property, camping in a different place each night.
- Touching, bittersweet and ultimately hopeful.
- Ages 7 to 10 years.



Younger Readers – Ideas & Activities



- Library display: Borrow or buy a second-hand ornate mirror (search Pinterest for 'Victorian style mirror' to get ideas). If you cannot source one, print of paint the image of a frame onto cardboard and use reflective silver card for the 'mirror'. Source a fake vine with red roses (available for under \$10 online) and drape it around the frame. Finally, on the mirror write 'His Name is... '.
- Activity: Create your own book cover for a book about your life (My Name Is _____), inspired by the cover design of *His Name Was Walter*. Choose a colour scheme, pattern and font that reflects your personality and draw some objects/icons that represent your life.
- Library display: Pitch a small tent or create one by draping cloth over taut rope and pegging the sides. Add a rolled-up sleeping bag and create a fake camp fire with sticks and crinkled red, yellow and orange cellophane. Include a 'Leave Taking' map in your display, alongside the book.
- Art activity: Create your own 'Leave Taking' map. It could be of your home/backyard, school or home town. Determine which places are important to you and mark them with keywords and little sketches.



Younger Readers (8-12 years)



- Cassie wants to be a writer and is writing a book for her dad as a gift.
- On the surface its about Cassie's quest to find her neighbour's missing peacocks but really about finding her way (and her courage) in a family where everyone and everything is changing.
- Older sister Diana is questioning everything and decides to practice Buddhism, father is probably bipolar, mother is having a mid-life crisis, eventually moves out and getting a boyfriend, grandfather is dying and Cassie suffers some form of depression.
- Age 10/12 years+



- Children from an orphanage start by competing with prestigious boarding school students, but ultimately band together to discover why so many kids are going missing
- Whispering kingdom has people who can control their actions and minds
- Kids saving kids (with a little help from some dragons!)
- Fun and exciting read that portrays strong messages of friendship, endurance, perseverance and strength
- Age: 10 years +

Younger Readers – Ideas & Activities



- Library display: Source low-cost peacock feathers online and fan them out against a bright blue sheet of card. Add a 'Notebook for Noticing' prop and a magnifying glass.
- Activity: Create your own 'Notebook for Noticing' and record information over the space of a weekend. What kind of things did you notice? Did anything strange or unusual happen? Write a short story based on your detective work.
- Library display: Using the book cover as inspiration, use strips of gold card on a black cardboard background to create the gates of the Brathelwaite Boarding School. Add the heading 'Who will win the Whispering Wars?'
- Activity: If you could create your own fantasy world, what would it look like? Draw a map of your new world, giving each country/area a name. For inspiration, look at the map in the book or uses the Genesis app to kickstart your world building.










Older Readers - Ideas & Activities



- Writing activity: Music is a key motif in the book. Write about a song that is important to you or that connected you to someone else.
- Activity: Read some of the first-hand accounts from refugees in mandatory detention on the website Behind the Wire and/or listen to the podcast 'The Messenger' .
- Discussion: What could the title Small Spaces mean? Discuss literal and metaphorical interpretations.
- Writing activity: Write a resolution to the story using one of the red herring endings alluded to throughout the book.
- Writing Activity: This story was inspired by the concept of an 'invisible friend' and wondering where those friends come from. Create your own story to explain the existence of an imaginary friend (either yours or someone else's).



Older Readers - Ideas & Activities



- Writing activity: Foxlee uses metaphor throughout *Lenny's* Book of Everything. Lenny talks about her "sadness flower" – it's her way of describing the sadness she feels when it rains. Choose your own metaphor to communicate an emotion (eg. anger, guilt, joy).
- Library display: Create 'exhibits' or dioramas of things featured in 'Burrel's Build-It-At-Home Encyclopedia'.



- Writing activity: Write your own 'road trip' journey. Think about what would motivate you to make this journey, the characters you could meet on the way, and what adventures you might have.
- **Discussion:** Changing Gear is a first-person narrative. Discuss why the author chose this perspective and how the novel would change if it was written in third person.

Older Readers (12+ years)



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- Charlotte is from a wealthy, prominent family but father is violent
- Luke and his mum struggle to survive, but his family has given him something more valuable than money
- Great text for generating classroom discussions about class prejudice, judgement and domestic violence
- Explores themes of trust, courage and acceptance
- Content: language, alcohol and drug use
- Age: 14/15 years +
- Lyrical verse novel, outstanding writing
- Set in 1960s Australia, following a German immigrant girl whose life and family history has been filled with grief
- Lottie's interest in death defies traditional notions of femininity
- Themes of grief, loss, identity and family
- Age: 14/15 years +



Older Readers - Ideas & Activities



- Activity: Read the description of the reservoir in chapter 2, • especially on pages 12–13. Sketch this scene, using evidence from the text.
- Research and write: Research Mondrian art. Write about why you think Luke relates to Mondrian art and compare this with your own thoughts and feelings about it.
- Research: Explore the history of taxidermy. Discuss its purpose. Do you see it as an art form? Why/why not?
- Art activity: The cover for The Art of Taxidermy won the ٠ Australian Book Designers Association 2019 award for best YA cover. Create your own book cover using botanical drawings.


